Professor Beate Herpertz-Dahlmann

University of Aachen Germany

Professor Herpertz-Dahlmann is a psychiatrist, and Clinical Director of the university clinic for Psychiatry, Psychosomatics and Psychotherapy of Childhood and Adolescence, and medical professor at the RWTH University (Rheinisch-Westfälische Technische Hochschule), Aachen, Germany. She has been a board member and former president of the German Society for Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, Psychosomatics and Psychotherapy, and a board member of the German Society for Eating Disorders. She is an international authority in the field of eating disorders, especially for her research on day patient treatment of anorexia nervosa, published in The Lancet, January 2014; She also has broader research interests in neuropsychiatric disorders such as early trauma, autism and conduct disorders.

Dr Dasha Nicholls

Great Ormond Street Hospital, London

Dr Nicholls completed her medical training in London and psychiatry training in

Eastbourne and at UCL, before moving to Great Ormond Street to specialise in Child Psychiatry. She was a research fellow and clinical lecturer at the Institute of Child Health, completing a doctorate on aspects of growth and development in early onset eating disorders, before taking up the role of lead for the Feeding and Eating Disorders service in 2001.

She has written national guidelines on the management of eating disorders in young people, and is President-Elect of the Academy for Eating Disorders. She has published research, book chapters and reviews on a number of areas to do with feeding and eating problems in young people.

Dr Rachel Bryant-Waugh

Great Ormond Street Hospital, London

Dr Bryant-Waugh is a Consultant Clinical Psychologist, and Joint Head of the Feeding and Eating Disorders Service, and Lead Psychologist in the Department of Child and Adolescent Mental Health (DCAMH). She is recipient of the British Psychological Society's May Davidson Award for her outstanding contribution to the field of childhood eating disorders. Her research interests include the development of targeted, disseminable interventions relevant to feeding and eating disorders in children, the classification of childhood feeding and eating disorders, factors impacting on the outcome of treatment for eating disorders, assessment and management of parental anxiety, and supporting pregnant women and new mothers with eating disorders.
