

CHAIRMAN'S COMMENT

NEW SECONDARY SCHOOL

The council reports that hundreds more parents are applying for school places this year, due to the rise in population and the improvement in local school results. The council has received 2,296 admission applications for September 2018, which is 268 more than last year. They say that there is an urgent need to build a new secondary school.

A new Harris Academy Wimbledon is due to open on a temporary site in September this year at Whatley Avenue (off Martin Way). This will be a non-selective state school for both girls and boys. The school is due to move to a permanent new school building in High Path, South Wimbledon, in September 2020.

Official figures from the government show that all the borough's secondary schools continue to be judged good or outstanding by Ofsted; and Department of Education results show that the progress pupils locally have made between the end of Key Stage 2 and the end of Key Stage 4 in eight subject qualifications, with maths and English given extra weight, is among the best in the country.

ROAD TRAFFIC CRASHES AT THE JUNCTION OF CROSSWAY AND WESTWAY

The local Guardian reports that a resident of Westway has seen six crashes at the junction of his road with Crossway within the last two years, and that he has had to replace his fence three times due to cars crashing into it. He is demanding that the council narrow the road or that CCTV measures are put in place to prevent a serious injury at this junction.

It is a very busy junction, particularly in the rush hour, and used by vehicles going to and from the two level crossings. Many pedestrians, including children, need to cross it.

The council states that it will carry out a further investigation into road safety in the area and will ask for police reports.

BUILDERS CHURNING UP GRASS VERGES

The trend for people to improve their homes by building extensions, including loft extensions, means that a number of local roads now have large builders' and scaffolding lorries parked near them for much of the day. These roads are often narrow and were not designed for vehicular use. The result is that the lorries park on grass verges,

leaving wheel ruts and destroying the grass, or else on the pavement or asphalt verge, damaging that. Prime examples of this can be seen in Heath Drive, off Grand Drive.

I understand that it is a requirement of planning permission that builders reinstate public property that has been damaged, but it is not always possible to find out which builder has caused which damage.

The problems in Heath Drive have been reported to the council by the Councillors. Building inspectors, when they certify the extensions, need also to make a note of the damage done to the local infrastructure, and ensure that this is re-instated at the builders' cost.

Improved services for Mental Health

Merton Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG)

Hannah Pearson from Merton CCG updated the Raynes Park Forum on future Commissioning Group intentions. The slides from her presentation can be found at: https://www.merton.gov.uk/council-and-local-democracy/community-forums/raynespark-community-forum

In response to questions from residents Hannah said Mental Health policy is a high priority for the CCG and there have been a number of recent improvements to local mental health services including:

- Improving Access to Psychological Therapies (IAPT) service – provides support for anxiety, depression and other conditions
- Merton Rapid Intervention service – a multi-disciplinary team that includes Mental Health professionals - and aims to prevent hospital admissions

 Crisis Cafés – informal, drop-in support services.

Artificial Grass Pitches on Beverley Meads Playing Fields?

A very controversial planning application has been lodged by Wimbledon Rugby Club to install artificial grass pitches on the public open space and Metropolitan Open land that currently form the sports grounds of Beverley Meads and Drax that adjoin Fishpond Woods and Wimbledon Common.

The application which includes a concrete base for the grass, asphalt hard standing for spectators, a two-metre high bund around the application area, a 1.5 metre white picket fence, as well as more floodlighting has outraged many residents living in the adjoining, mostly privately maintained roads.

Objectors point out that apart from the blot on the landscape that this proposal implies, the increased usage (10.00-21.00 hrs on weekdays and 10.00-20.00 at the weekends) will put intolerable pressure on the surrounding roads, as there is insufficient parking provision already; as well as considerable intrusion into their own right to some peaceful enjoyment of their surroundings.

It will be interesting to see how the Council will react to the pressures from significant bodies such as the RFU and Sports England for approval. To residents, it simply smacks of over-

commercialisation and despoilment of public open space.

Notes from the RAYNES PARK ASSOCIATION

Raynes Park Enhancement Plan.

Railway News. Chris Larkman said that Stephen Hammond MP has called a meeting of senior Network Rail managers to try and assist us in having a useful dialogue with them. Chris gave the example of the embankments, and the commitment from NR to plant and maintain them. The current situation is that NR denies any knowledge of such an agreement. Whilst there are issues we wish to raise at the meeting, the key outcome we're looking to achieve is an effective means of communication between ourselves and NR.

Bins on the North Side of the Skew Arch. Chris Larkman said he's tried to get some clarification from Cllr Jill West but has not received a reply. Suzanne agreed to follow this up with her. It was noted that these bins are within the RAWW area. It is generally agreed that local bins such as these attract additional rubbish whilst not providing a useful service to local people.

CrossRail2. There is still no news on a timescale as to when the local plans will be published and questions about the Government's commitment to the project. Jerry Cuthbert speculated on the push to provide more funding to the north of England and to the viability of the agreement for shared funding between the Government and London. Meanwhile developments in the local area are on hold pending a decision.

Local Business Issues & Updates.

Members were unclear as to what is happening with Absolute Abode. It appears the café area is being extended, and the notice states it is closed for refurbishment. Chris Larkman said he'd emailed Kirsty but received no reply. He agreed to email her again [Subsequent to the meeting a member confirmed that the company had gone into liquidation].

Other Business

Heathrow Expansion. Pat Erricker queried to what extent any 3rd runway may have on aircraft movements overhead in our area. There is an open exhibition of plans at the Antoinette Hotel from 12.00 to 20.00 on 22 February.

Council Request for Local

Concerns. Pat asked whether we were informing the Council of our local needs. Tony said that we have put in a request for CIL money to assist with identified local improvements.

Raynes Park SNT. Pat noted the reduction and therefore lack of Community Police presence now in Raynes Park. It was agreed to raise this at our next meeting.

Waitrose Volunteers. Pat Erricker produced a Waitrose leaflet offering their 'partners time' to volunteer locally. Chris L agreed to speak to the manager asking how he felt we could usefully work with this scheme.

Business Breakfast. The next breakfast is on Tuesday 13 February.

Role of Raynes Park Champion.

Some members queried whether the role of the Raynes Park Champion was continuing. Chris Larkman agreed to follow up on this with Neil Milligan.

Community Forum. The next Community Forum is due on 8 March with Cllr Michael Bull chairing. Matters for consideration include Wheelie Bins, Report back from railway meeting with Stephen Hammond, Bins on the northside, CrossRail2. Future dates: 14 June, 18 September, 6 December, 26 March 2019.

Notes from the **RAYNES PARK FORUM**

Chris Edge (Raynes Park Association) opened the meeting, welcoming everyone and introducing Councillor Lewis-Lavender as the Chair.

Open Forum

Nell Allen ("No Wheelies Please" campaign) reported that following the submission of the petition to the Council the response has not adequately addressed the proposals that had been made and as a result she planned to escalate this to the Overview and Scrutiny Commission). Nell had a meeting with Veolia where they were in favour of her suggestions that: 1. All Merton's future bins and recycling boxes should be one colour (brown) 2. All bins should be without a Merton Council logo 3. Stickers should be provided for residents to place on each bin to establish content.

A clear majority of those present agreed that these suggestions will now be put to the Council in a motion in conjunction with the Wimbledon Community Forum.

Councillor Suzanne Grocott

provided an update following a recent Street stall to talk to residents. A number of street lights were out and need fixing; cycling on the pavement under the Arch remains an issue: a filter on the traffic lights on Grand Drive into Bushey Road could be suggested and the phasing of the lights could be adjusted. Councillor Grocott has raised these issues with

the Council. A resident suggested a roundabout at the Grand Drive iunction would be helpful. Another resident commented that a resolution to the cycling on pavement issue would be to improve cycling safety on the road. A resident raised concerns about a recent spate of burglaries in the area, especially in the Apostles Area. The local Safer Neighbourhood Team had provided some crime prevention advice including making use of the Alley-gates scheme and joining Neighbourhood Watch. It was agreed to invite the SNT to a future meeting.

Flooding in Raynes Park area Carl Leadbeater from Thames Water attended the Forum to provide an update on the issues raised at the last meeting and the flooding on Abbot Avenue in July.

Thames Water has begun a catchment study to understand the hydraulic issues that are causing the problems. In response to questions from residents. Carl said that blocked gullies maybe a factor but until the study was complete they could not be certain. Recent price increases in water bills have been in-line with inflation and many customers found they could reduce their bills by installing a water meter. Water pressure is maintained at 1 bar as that is the requirement for most domestic appliances, whilst higher pressure 2 increases the risk of leaks. If pressures are not at this level, please report to Thames Water.

Thames Water agreed to come back to future Raynes Park Community

Forum meetings to provide further updates.

Stephen Hammond MP

Wimbledon Police Station closure – Stephen will be taking this up with the Borough Commander at a meeting as well as writing to the Mayor of London. The Consultation Institute said this had been the worst consultation of 2017. Stephen said that the decision should be reconsidered on operational grounds, including the impact on shift patterns; the close access to the night time economy; and joint use by British Transport Police.

Crossrail 2 – discussions on the funding package is on-going. The timing of when money from TfL will be available is currently the critical element.

South Western Railway – residents commented that the new franchisee has not been an improvement so far, with strikes scheduled as well. Stephen responded that it was unfortunate that the new franchise started at the same time as the major works at Waterloo, but there remains an ongoing issue with a shortage of drivers. They should soon be providing longer trains and improved frequency, especially at weekends.

Boundary Commission Review – the revised proposals in October included a complete Wimbledon constituency and Stephen thanked all those who had responded to the previous consultation. After the current consultation concludes the Commission will finalise their proposals and report to Parliament in autumn 2018.

Raynes Park Station – Stephen would be meeting with Network Rail along with the Raynes Park Association in mid-February.

Jerusalem – In answer to a question Stephen said the UK Government's position is clear. We recognise and believe that Tel Aviv should remain Israel's capital. Donald Trump's suggestion/ recognition of Jerusalem as the capital was surprising and likely to impede any peace negotiations. The UK Government did not agree with the President's comments the bins have been removed and additional seating might be installed in the summer. Tony agree to check on the access around the Astroturf. Negotiations with Network Rail are ongoing over access to the embankment but no progress so far.

In Memoriam Claude Etienne Albert Bonnichon



We are sad to report that Claude, known to many as a wonderful neighbour, died in January. We send our condolences to his widow Dorothy and to his children, grandchildren and great grandson.

Claude was an engaging, hospitable and courteous man with a talent and a passion for teaching. He had a great sense of humour and was always ready to support others.

Following a brilliant teaching career, he was appointed the headteacher of Joseph Tritton Junior School in Battersea and remained there until his retirement. He continued to stay in touch with former colleagues and pupils, kept abreast of educational developments and was an English SATs marker for several years.

Whilst his teaching career was, latterly, mainly London-based, his chosen home for over forty years was in Raynes Park. He lived in Seaforth Avenue, then Westway (where he became a road steward) and he had a great appreciation of the local people and the general area.

Until very recently Claude drove with Dorothy each summer to his beloved area of La Lavandou in France. He was ninety and was still full of energy and enthusiasm for life when, just before Christmas, he sustained a fall whilst out shopping. He did not recover as expected and was then found to be suffering from an inoperable brain tumour. He died peacefully in Princess Alice Hospice with Dorothy by his side.

At his funeral his grandsons spoke of a loving family man who inspired them with his courage - his "no fear" attitude to life's challenges - and his generous, friendly disposition to all he encountered.



CROSSRAIL 2

A NETWORK RAIL UPDATE

Chris Curtis from Network Rail Speaking at December's Raynes Park Forum, provided an update on Network Rail's part in Crossrail 2.

Network Rail will be responsible for the sections of the route that are above ground, including south of Wimbledon. Work is already underway to increase capacity in the area, with the upgrade of Waterloo meaning longer trains from December 2017; a new wider concourse from December 2018 and new 10 coach trains from 2019/20. Even after this work there will still be a need to increase capacity as London and the South East continue to grow. The benefits of Crossrail 2 will extend as far as Portsmouth and Southampton.


The issue of level crossings is a significant challenge. With the increased frequency of trains, the current crossings will not be adequate, so work continues to find an appropriate solution, the priority will be to avoid taking any homes. Building bridges could resolve congestion caused by closing level crossings.

The new trains will also require changes at Raynes Park station with longer, straighter platforms and all stations on the route will be step free. Whilst these works could be delivered

in the early stages of construction it would not be viable to introduce step free access before Crossrail 2. The funding arrangements currently require 50% of the construction costs to be met during the construction phase. Routes have been reviewed but it should be noted that the route south of Wimbledon accounts for 5% of the cost of the project but 30-40% of the benefit. Chris Curtis agreed with residents that Crossrail 2 could offer an opportunity to provide wider improvements to the public realm in Raynes Park and said that one of the lessons from Crossrail was the importance of working with local authorities and communities.

The next consultation should take place in 2018, with the Hybrid Bill completed by 2023 and then a ten-year construction period would take place.

CROSSRAIL 2 – UPDATE

The overall picture

Whilst the Crossrail 2 project team continue to liaise with the Raynes Park community, in reality, not much new information has been forthcoming since the last round of consultation in 2015/16. Yet, we still have no real detail about how Raynes Park might be affected, apart from what might be implied from the broad-brush information from over two years ago.

In 2017, Crossrail 2 prepared its strategic business case and submitted it to the Transport Secretary. While this showed that London could pay for half of the scheme over its life, the Mayor for London and Transport Secretary agreed to see how London might fund half of the scheme during construction.

This would seem to imply that London's 50% share of the funding was partly predicated on income streams generated by the new railway and associated developments along its route.

In February 2018, it was announced that the government has called for an independent financial review to look at the project's overall financial viability and whether or not the costs might be reduced. What the outcome will be remains to be seen. However, it may affect the overall scope and its phasing.

Therefore, no further formal public consultation is anticipated until this new assessment has been completed and reviewed by the Department for Transport. This whole process is expected to take another year, putting back any further public consultation at least until early 2019.

Whilst this is news it heralds further delays and continued uncertainty for

the project.

Additionally, there are now political questions being raised over the Private Finance Initiative (PFI) and competing pleas for more transport funding in other parts of the country.

Against this background, TfL is now forecasting a £1bn operating deficit for 2018/19, although it does have plans to turn this around by 2021.

All these problems will make the Gordian Knot of funding the construction of Crossrail 2 harder to untangle.
